
Fellow International Educator,

PREPARATION

Hide the three eggs in three students' desks, one egg per desk, before Bible class. Continue this activity each day using the other pictures from BLM 29B to discuss the importance of each

The Power of a Strong Network

One of the greatest blessings of Christian education is that **we are not alone**. We are part of a greater mission—a larger community committed to glorifying God through our schools, our students, and our leadership.

But here is the question: Do you have a network?

Leadership can feel isolating if we try to carry the weight alone. But when we intentionally lean into relationships, seek mentorship, and build a community of support, we don't just grow as leaders—we flourish.

How Renewal Strengthens Our Leadership

In Strengthening the Soul of Your Leadership, Ruth Haley Barton reminds us that leaders must tend to their own souls before they can effectively lead others.

Too often, we pour out without taking time to reflect and renew. But when we pause—when we create intentional space for solitude and silence—we allow God to strengthen our hearts, refine our purpose, and renew our vision.

This rhythm of **review**, **reflect**, **and refine** is essential for continuous growth:

- Review Where are you thriving in relationships? Where are you struggling?
- Reflect What is God revealing to you about how you lead and connect with others?
- Refine What intentional steps can you take to deepen relationships and strengthen your leadership?

An Invitation to Connect

As we move forward, let's be intentional about how we do things.

- **Prioritize relationships**—with God and with those you lead.
- **Seek out your network**—lean into ACSI and the people around you for encouragement and growth.
- **Create space for renewal**—because leading well starts with being spiritually and emotionally whole.

You were never meant to do this alone.

Who can you reach out to this week for encouragement, support, or mentorship? Take one intentional step to connect and watch how God uses relationships to strengthen your leadership and renew your mission. We are truly stronger together!

Easter Activity Continued

INTRODUCTION

Explain that on each day of the Easter lesson, three students will find a plastic egg hidden in their desk. Have students look for the eggs and invite those who find one to open it. Encourage the class to guess how each enclosed item represents a part of the Easter Bible truth, but do not comment yet on their answers. (Answers will vary.) Convey that the correct answers will be given later.

DIRECTED INSTRUCTION

Direct students to place a cover sheet over the entire page and have them turn to Luke 22. Review (from Lesson 15.2) that the Israelites' celebration of Passover was a reminder of when God freed His people from slavery in Egypt. Convey to students that they will learn about Jesus's last meal, which took place during Passover and is known as the Last Supper. Read the following paraphrase of Luke 22:1–13 as a summary:

As the Passover, the Feast of Unleavened Bread, approached, the chief priests and other religious leaders were looking for ways to kill Jesus. Satan entered Judas Iscariot, one of the 12 disciples. The priests agreed to pay Judas 30 pieces of silver to betray Jesus, so Judas began watching for an opportunity. Then came the day for preparing the Passover lamb. Jesus sent Peter and John to find a room for the disciples to prepare and celebrate. They found the room just as Jesus had described.

Explain that "betray" means to turn against a friend. Ask who made a plan to betray Jesus. (Judas Iscariot) Pause for students to uncover and complete Exercise 1.

Read Luke 22:14–23, which describes the Last Supper, as students follow along. Then have students complete Exercise 2.

Convey that in verses 24–28, the disciples argued about greatness. Jesus reminded them that the greatest among them loves and serves others, as He had demonstrated when He washed His disciples' feet (John 13:1–17). Peter then proclaimed that he would go with the Lord, to prison and even to death (Luke 22:33). Assign a student to read Luke 22:34 for Jesus's response. Pause for students to complete Exercise 3. Read this paraphrase of verses 39–46:

After supper, Jesus and His disciples went out to a garden to pray. Jesus instructed them to pray that they would not give in to temptation. He found a quiet place and prayed that God would spare Him from this death if possible but also prayed for God's will, not His own, to be done. An angel from heaven appeared and gave Him strength. The Lord was in so much agony that His sweat became like drops of blood falling to the ground. Returning to His disciples, Jesus found them not praying but sleeping!

Remark that Jesus knew He would have to go through suffering but that He still prayed selflessly for God's will and submitted to God's plan—even if submission meant His death. Continue by reading **Luke 22:47–53**. Pause for students to complete Exercise 4. Conclude by reading **Luke 22:54–62**. Pause for students to complete Exercise 5. Review their answers.

Direct students who found the eggs to display again the enclosed item or picture. Discuss the symbolism of each by using the information on the back of BLM 29B. Keep the eggs in the egg carton.

REVIEW AND APPLICATION

- What feast was Jesus celebrating with His disciples? (Passover)
- Who betrayed Jesus? (The disciple Judas Iscariot)
- What did Jesus pray for in the garden? (For God's will to be done)
- What did Jesus say that Peter would do? (Deny Him three times before the rooster crowed)

- Jesus submitted to God's will even though it meant pain and death for Him. Have you ever prayed for God's will, not yours, to be done? Tell about that time. (Answers will vary)
- Jesus was fully God but also fully man. How do you think Jesus was feeling in the garden when He prayed so hard that His sweat was like drops of blood? (Answers will vary)
- Judas betrayed Jesus for 30 pieces of silver. Think about whether you have ever betrayed a friend. If so, think of your motive—was it popularity, acceptance, or perhaps a lack of self-esteem? Ask God for His forgiveness and take steps to seek forgiveness from that person.
